Course Description:

 Grade 9 Mathematics is a foundation course to prepare students for multiple possible pathways in Grades 10 to 12. The course builds on the understandings from Kindergarten to Grade 8 Mathematics, and continues with the four strands of mathematics: number, patterns and relations, shape and space, and statistics and probability.

• The activities that take place in my Grade 9 Mathematics classroom stem from a problem-solving approach and are based on six mathematical processes. Students should develop an understanding of the nature of mathematics through specific knowledge, skills, and connections among and between strands and units of study (see below).

Linear Relations	Generalize a pattern arising from a problem-solving context using linear equations and verify by substitution. Graph linear relations, analyze the graph, and interpolate or extrapolate to solve problems.	See above	Approx. 10 days
Polynomials	Demonstrate an understanding of polynomials. Model, record, and explain the operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division of polynomial expressions concretely, pictorially, and symbolically.	See above	Approx. 10 days
Linear Equations & Inequalities	Model and solve problems using linear equations. Explain and illustrate strategies to solve single variable linear inequalities with rational number coefficients within a problem-solving context.	See above	Approx. 10 days
Similarities & Transformations	Demonstrate an understanding of similarity of polygons. Draw and interpret scale diagrams of 2-D shapes. Demonstrate an understanding of line and rotation symmetry.	See above	Approx. 10 days
Circle Geometry	Solve problems and justify the solution strategy using circle properties.	See above	Approx. 5 days

Probability & Statistics	Describe the effect of bias, use of language, ethics, cost, time and timing, privacy, cultural sensitivity on the collection of data. Select and defend the choice of using either a population or a sample of a population to answer a question. Develop and implement a project plan for the collection, display, and analysis of data. Demonstrate an understanding of the role of probability in society. Assessment Guidelines

There are various purposes for assessment:

- Assessment *for* learning **(formative assessment)**: where assessment helps teachers gain insight into what students understand in order to plan and guide instruction, and provide helpful feedback to students.
- Assessment *of* learning **(summative assessment)**: where assessment informs students, teachers and parents, as well as the broader educational community, of achievement at a certain point in time in order to celebrate success, plan interventions and support continued progress.
